



Durat is comprised of up to 28% post-industrial (pre-consumer) recycled content. Durat has a published Health Product Declaration (HPD) for its materials.

Durat contributes to the LEED building standard in the following ways:

<p>Materials and Resources - Building product disclosure and optimization - sourcing of raw materials</p> <p>Option 2. Leadership extraction practices (1 point)</p> <p>Recycled content. Recycled content is the sum of <u>postconsumer recycled content</u> plus one-half the <u>preconsumer recycled content</u>, based on cost. Products meeting recycled content criteria are valued at 100% of their cost for the purposes of credit achievement calculation.</p>	<p>Materials and Resources – MRc4 - Recycled content</p> <p>Recycled Content - (up to 2 points)</p> <p>Use materials with recycled content such that the sum of postconsumer recycled content plus 1/2 of the preconsumer³ content constitutes at least 10% or 20%, based on cost, of the total value of the materials in the project. The minimum percentage materials recycled for each point threshold is as follows:</p> <p>Recycled Content – 10% - 1 point</p> <p>Recycled Content – 20% - 2 points</p>
<p>Materials and Resources - Building product disclosure and optimization - material ingredients</p> <p>Option 1. material ingredient reporting (1 point)</p> <p>Health Product Declaration. The end use product has a published, complete Health Product Declaration with full disclosure of known hazards in compliance with the Health Product Declaration open Standard.</p>	

Note: Individual products can *contribute* to earning point(s) using the LEED standard. The use of a certain product does not “earn” a point; it *contributes* to attaining a certain point. Manufacturers who state that their products “earn points” or that a project will “get a point” by using their products are misinformed.
